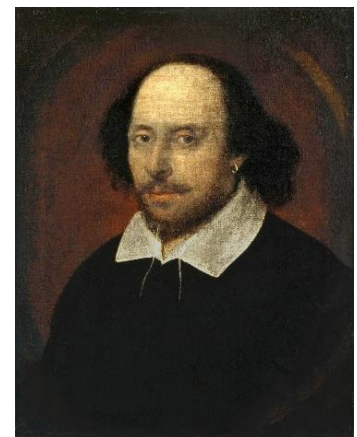

Meet CCH class author... William Shakespeare



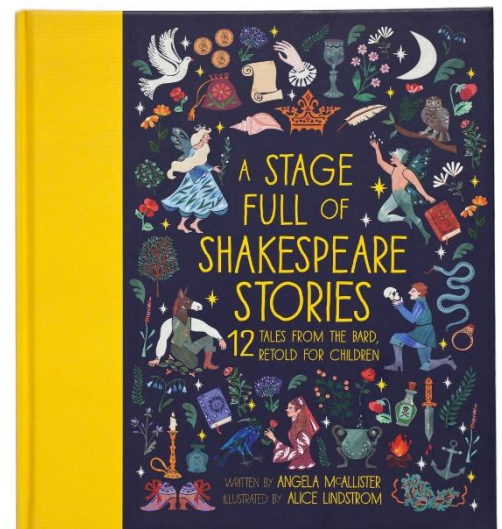
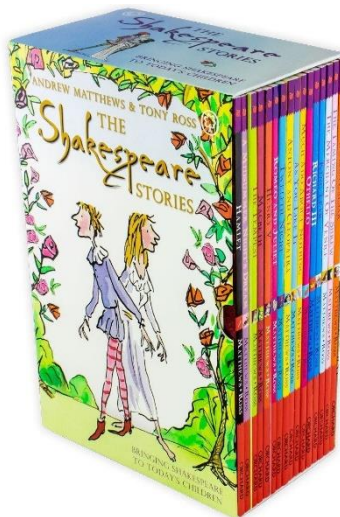
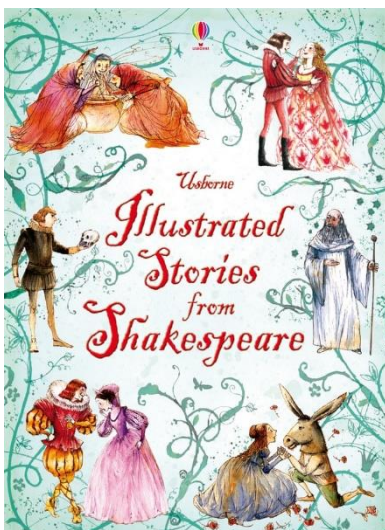

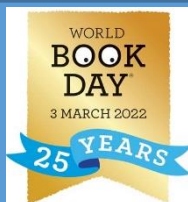
Did you know?

During his lifetime, Shakespeare wrote around 37 plays and over 150 poems!

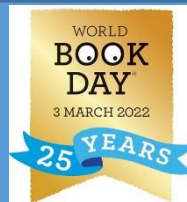

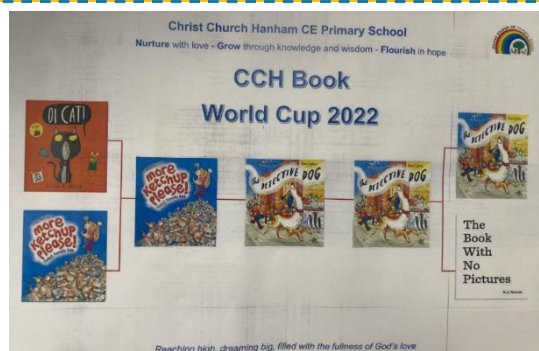




World Book Day fun!

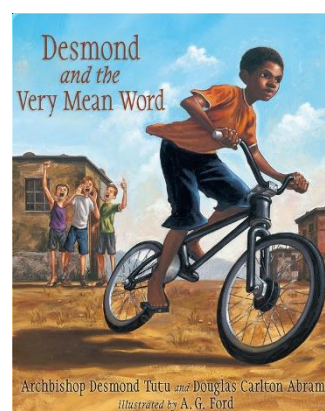
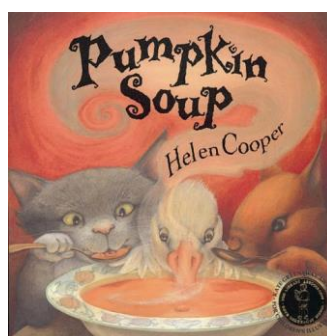
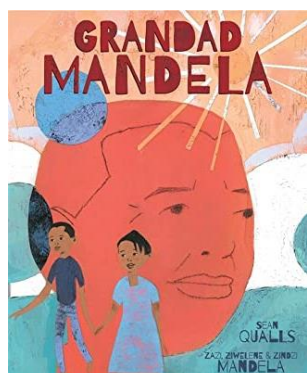
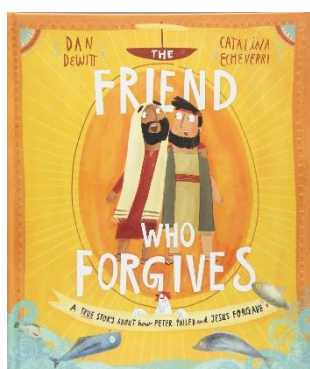

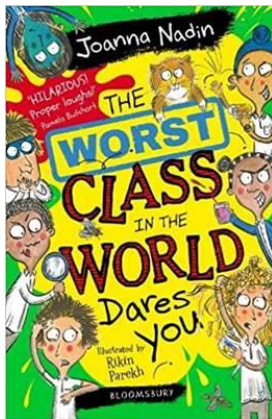
Reading Round-up!

For ages 6-8 +

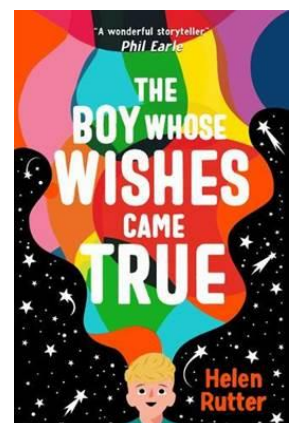
The Worst Class in the World Dares You! by Joanna Nadin

The Boy whose Wishes Came True by Helen Rutter

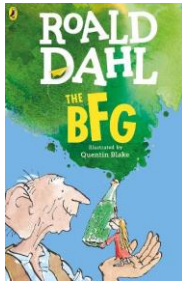
